

HISTORY OF DRIVER'S LICENSES FOR ALL

Until 2003, anyone regardless of immigration status could obtain a Minnesota driver's license.

2003

At the request of the Governor, the Department of Public Safety changes the administrative rules to require proof of lawful admission to the U.S. to obtain a driver's license. This change was made without a House or Senate vote.

2013-2014

The Senate passes the "Driver's Licenses for All" bill (<u>SF271</u>). The House does not pass the companion bill.

2017-2018

Both houses of the legislature pass and the Governor signs into law (HF470, Minn. Stat. § 171.015) prohibiting the Department of Public Safety from changing administrative rules regarding proof needed to obtain a driver's license

2019-2020

The House passes the "Driver's Licenses for All" bill (<u>HF1500</u>). The Senate does not pass the companion bill.

2021-2022

The House Transportation
Committee and the Ways and
Means Committee pass the
"Driver's Licenses for All" bill
(<u>HF1163</u>). Neither the full
House nor the Senate passes
the bill.
